


How a Helping Hand from LAHIA Transformed My Life — Jill's Story

I now have a relationship with my mother — we had become separated for way longer than I could have ever imagined. I'm desperately trying to make up for lost time, and I see them two or three times a week. I've already begun my journey and I could not have done it without the help of LAHIA!

Ed is going to IRSC tuition-free with the Florida College System's Homeless Fee Exemption. The Florida College System is a network of 28 community colleges, colleges and state colleges that provides a primary access point to higher education for Floridians.

LAHIA paid for his textbook, and Ed was off to college! He knows that learning how to use and fix computers will continue to be a valuable skill in the future.

Ed is improving his job skills so he can work well in the future. Ed's wife, Mary Ann, is enthusiastic about his efforts. With Ed at IRSC nearly every day doing his schoolwork, Mary Ann has lots of time for her favorite hobby — reading.
